

A changing Downtown

Downtown has become the gravitational center of New York City. It's also fast becoming the center of culture and taste-making in New York.

Gucci and Hermès are here today. Vogue editors nudge up against New Yorker writers at Australian espresso kiosks. Streets are lined with blockbuster architectural achievements, including Santiago Calatrava's 4-billion-dollar Oculus.

Cultural institutions have put Downtown on the map as a destination for dance, music and art.

Marquee chefs – including David Chang,

Jean Georges Vongertichten, Tom Colicchio and Nobu Matsuhisa – are realizing their most exciting projects. An explosion of restaurants and green markets, including a new Whole Foods Market at One Wall Street, make living and eating well effortless.

The area below Chambers Street is one of the most historic, eclectic and greenest districts in New York. Many of Downtown's open spaces are on the water's edge, with glittering vistas out to sea. Within moments lie many of the city's best parks, plazas, public spaces, cycling and jogging paths, as well as lush gardens and children's playgrounds.

One Wall Street is at the center of all this: a beacon for an elevated way of living in New York's oldest and newest neighborhood.

The Residences

One Wall Street's exceptional layouts are inspired by the building's original scale. Ceiling heights are up to 10 feet, with expansive, fluted windows. Each home is a timeless masterpiece, exemplified by exquisite material choices. Floors are made of wide-plank, French oak in chevron or straight patterns. Natural stone features throughout, including marble from the same quarry that inspired the Italian sculptor Bernini. Kitchens are airy and light. Select residences extend outside to generous balconies and private garden terraces.

And the views are exceptional. Facing Lower Manhattan and the East and Hudson Rivers, these extend from the Chrysler Building to the New York Harbor. Rich architectural details and textures of Lower Manhattan surround One Wall Street, creating a fascinating vista from every floor.

THE LANDMARKS OF DOWNTOWN

1 Trinity Church

A traditional high church. The Gothic Revival structure standing today is the third iteration of the church since 1698.

2 The New York Stock Exchange

George B. Post's landmark structure opened its doors for trading in 1903. Inside, the exchange floor is surrounded by marble walls and 95-foot windows.

3 Federal Hall

In a building that once served as HQ for the nation's capital, this museum is devoted to early American history.

4 Federal Reserve

The 22 story limestone headquarters building that houses the Federal Reserve Bank of New York was designed to express strength, stability and security.

5 Cunard Building

The Cunard Building is an Italian Renaissance style building. Once home to steamship operator Cunard Lines, it now houses an opulent event space.

6 Stone Street

A pedestrian-only cobblestone walkway lined with bars and restaurants.

7 The Battery

25 acres of dreamy perennial gardens, the Seaglass Carousel and cafés.

8 Battery Park City Ball Fields and Esplanade

Hudson River Greenway. Outdoor sports fields, basketball courts, ping pong, skateboarding, playgrounds and parks.

9 North Cove Marina and Sailing School Marina, sailing school, ice-skating rink surrounded by restaurants and cafés.

10 One World Trade Center and 9/11 Memorial

Stunning reflective skyscraper and memorial steps from the Oculus.

11 St. Paul's Chapel

Built in 1766, St. Paul's Chapel is where George Washington once worshiped.

12 City Hall and Brooklyn Bridge

Palatial complex of beautiful government buildings alongside manicured gardens leading to the famous arches of the Brooklyn Bridge.

13 Pier 15, East River Esplanade Multilevel public pier for picnicking, basking in the sun and taking in the views of Brooklyn.


14 Pier 17 and Seaport Historic District Built in the early 1800s, today this historic district is a serious foodie and shopping destination.

15 Statue of Liberty

Just the views from the ferry are astonishing. But getting to the top of Lady Liberty is a real treat: views for miles and a close encounter with this iconic symbol of freedom and democracy.


16 Governors Island





The Battery Park City Esplanade

The Esplanade is a set of wide pedestrian and jogging/cycling paths on the shore of the Hudson River.

Along the Esplanade are basketball courts, picnicking spots, idyllic gardens, beautifully landscaped parks, innovative playgrounds and uninterrupted dramatic views of the New York Harbor.

The North Meadow

Picnic grounds, sports fields, basketball courts, ping pong, skateboarding, playgrounds, parks, ice-skating, sailing and more, all right here.

Wagner Park

One Wall Street is surrounded by more than 84 acres of open space – equivalent to 63 football fields – including the city's greatest waterfront parks, gardens, and New York Harbor views.

A quick ferry-ride away, Governors Island has vast green fields, landscaped gardens, ball-fields and cycling trails.

Imagination Playground

Designed by David Rockwell, the Imagination Playground is a kid-friendly amenity on John Street in the Historic Seaport District.

1 The Battery

Battery Place. Ferries pick up visitors to the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island, and all summer long concerts play on its grounds. Its beautiful waterfront and flower gardens make a lovely place to wander.

2 Bowling Green

Broadway and Whitehall Street. New York City's oldest park, this spot served as the council ground for Native American tribes and was the site of the legendary sale of Manhattan to Peter Minuit in 1626.

3 South Cove Park

50 Battery Place. Dog-free waterfront park featuring walkways and quays with scenic harbor views and a relaxed atmosphere.

4 Battery Park City

Set along the Hudson River, Battery Park City is a mainly residential neighborhood of upscale high-rise with casual eateries and bars drawing professionals from the nearby Financial District.

5 Battery Park City Ball Fields and Esplanade

Hudson River Greenway. Outdoor sports fields, basketball courts, ping pong, skateboarding, playgrounds and parks.

6 West Thames Park

203 West Street. Busy urban park offering a large playground, water play structure, sports courts and community garden.

7 Little West Dog Run

70 Little W Street. Open 24 hours this dog park in Lower Manhattan is perfect for your K9 friend.

8 Liberty Park

155 Cedar Street. Rooftop public space with tree-shaded seating areas. The green space overlooks the 9/11 Memorial and Museum and the rest of the World Trade Center campus.

9 Zuccotti Park

Broadway and Liberty Street. Popular with lunchtime crowds, this tree-shaded park has many seating options and sculptures in a privately owned public space.

10 Vietnam Veterans Plaza

Broad Street and Old Slip. Dedicated in honor of the men and women of New York who served in the United States armed forces especially those who died fighting the Vietnam War.

11 City Hall Park

Broadway and Chambers Street.
Surrounded by centuries-old majestic government buildings that date back to 1812, this park provides a much-needed green space in a bustling area perfect for lunchtime strolls on its grassy lawns.

12 Imagination Playground

Designed by architect David Rockwell, Imagination Playground is an interactive, transformable space that prompts children to manipulate their environment and create a play space of their own.


13 East River Waterfront Esplanade


TRANSPORTATION HUB

One Wall Street is at the center of a connected transportation network: 13 subway lines, 2 PATH trains, 30 bus routes and 7 bus routes converge here. The \$4 billion Calatrava-designed World Trade Center Transportation Hub connects to trains, subways and ferries; it also forms the most integrated network of underground pedestrian pathways in the city. There are 28 Citi Bike stations and numerous cycling paths.

The West Side Highway, FDR Drive, Brooklyn and Manhattan Bridges, and Holland and Hugh L. Carey Tunnels are all easily accessible, making jaunts up or out-of-town easily accessible.

With the Seaport now a major cultural destination, and the Brooklyn waterfront a glorious outdoor paradise, the Downtown based ferry service has taken off. Twenty ferry lines connect Downtown to Brooklyn, New Jersey, Governor's Island and Upper Manhattan.

The Team

One Wall Street stands proudly as a building of no compromises. Built in 1931 by Ralph Walker, the elegant, landmarked building has undergone a complex transformation by Macklowe Properties. The visionary developer, along with a team of leading architects, specialists and craftspeople, has fastidiously restored, reimagined and renovated this iconic building.

One Wall Street offers residents an exceptional lifestyle within an extraordinary piece of Manhattan's history.

Architect

Ralph Walker

Around 1910, Ralph Walker (1889-1973) made a decision that would forever shape his professional life as an architect; following several years as a student at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Walker decided not to continue his studies at Paris's École des Beaux-Arts, then widely considered the most important and influential school of art and architecture in the world. Several years later, without an education steeped in the forms of Classicism (though Walker had seen the landmarks of Europe while on a scholarshipfinanced Grand Tour) the young architect went to work for the New York-based firm of McKenzie, Voorhees & Gmelin. There he designed a combined office building and switching station for New York Telephone, the first project in which he played a major role. Walker's design eschewed a historically rooted approach, including that promoted by the École. Completed in 1926, the Barclay-Vesey Building, as the acclaimed structure came to be known—a noted critic predicted that the building was "destined to be a monument of American progress in architecture"—constituted a bold step in the evolution of skyscraper design.

At One Wall Street, Walker similarly rejected the literal qualities of neighboring skyscrapers that adapted styles as varied as Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, and Federal, as well as the grand flourishes of nearby Beaux-Arts civic buildings such as the U.S Customs House, in favor of something more forward-looking and subtle, but equally memorable. In its synthesis of refined aesthetics and practical considerations—setbacks that allow light to penetrate not only the streets below but the interiors within-One Wall Street epitomizes an authentic vison of New York as a quintessentially modern city. Upon receiving the Centennial Medal of Honor from the Institute of Architects in 1957, Walker was praised by Frank Lloyd Wright as, "The only other honest architect in America." At that same time, the New York Times succinctly identified Walker as the "Architect of the Century."
